#### Introduction

Students will become familiar with and use English terminology of anesthesia for reading and writing academic texts.

## **Learning Outcomes**

- Acquiring English vocabulary in medicine and anesthesia
- Identifying roots, prefixes, and suffixes in medical terms
- Developing skills for reading and writing anesthesia texts
- Mastering translation skills in translating texts from English to Persian
- Mastering translation skills in translating texts from Persian to English
- Understanding the importance of pronunciation sub-skill and in particular phonetic alphabet, stress, and accent for establishing effective communication

## **Course Goals**

The course aims at helping students learn medical terms, including roots, suffixes, and prefixes, in the field of anesthesia and fill the gap between their general knowledge of English and the medical literature to which they will be exposed in their future academic and professional lives. To this end, students will become familiar with a broad range of technical terms which are used by the professional practitioners of the field. They will also become familiar with English Language International Phonetic Alphabet (IPA) and a number of translation strategies and learn how to use dictionary.

- translate the technical terms in their field of study
- translate texts in their field of study
- write academically
